Session One

Adult Education Budget Management - Simonds Room

Facilitators: Dr. Josh McNaughton, PVAEC Adult Education and Kelley Heath, Maine Department of Adult Education

The presentation will assist adult education directors in developing a thorough understanding of the following topics; defining budget lines, cost centers, and their intended uses. Presenters will give a brief overview of Maine's current subsidy formula (and an update based on subsidy committee work at the time of the conference). The group will also work to understand matching grant funds and revenue sources including state subsidy, local contributions, grants, and anticipated revenue. The presentations will conclude with methods of expense management and budget monitoring. Bring a copy of your budget to follow along!

Although extensive research has been conducted on the language acquisition benefits of dialogue journals in ESOL contexts, insufficient attention has been given to exploring how and why multilingual learners communicate when given an open-ended opportunity and platform. Drawing from practitioner research conducted at a community college in Southern Maine, the speaker will discuss her experience introducing dialogue journals in an ESOL pre-college composition class. The presenter will first discuss the attributes of dialogue journaling as identity construction and interactive, tailored learning opportunities for students. Then, using examples and materials, the presenter will offer dialogue journal formatting and prompt suggestions for different English proficiency levels, class sizes, and course structures.

Improving Adult Learners' Attitudes and Odds for Workplace Success - Whittier Room

Facilitator: Greg Stultz, New Readers Press

Participate in thought-provoking discussions and activities that introduce habits, skills, and strategies your higher-level MLL and ABE students need to get a job and succeed. Discover how you can incorporate activities like these in your MLL and ABE classroom to equip your students for the workplace. In this workshop, participants will identify and discuss essential employability skills (aka soft skills), engaging in numerous activities taken from WorkWise - a three-workbook series published by New Readers Press. From the first workbook, Choosing a Job, they will explore exercises that build self-confidence, such as having a positive attitude, setting SMART goals, identifying strengths and weaknesses, likes and dislikes, etc. Using lesson excerpts from the second book, Getting a Job, they will take a close look at preparing for the interview and what to do afterwards. Then, taking several activities from book 3, Starting a Job, they'll discuss topics like comparing pay and benefits, honesty/integrity, social media suggestions, making a schedule, and problem-solving. The tone of this workshop is disarming, conversational, and, dare I say it? Fun!

<u>Creating Pre-Apprenticeship Programs Leading to Credentials and Meaningful Employment - Ketchum Room</u>

Lewiston Adult Education will describe their involvement in the creation of their Healthcare Pathways Pre-Apprenticeship program and one of their partnering employers will speak to how this program has helped prepare individuals for employment in their CNA apprenticeship program. Attendees will learn how this program is creating credentialed professionals for the workplace through registered apprenticeship and pre-apprenticeship pathways.
